

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Terms in Office 1974-2017









How 'unremarkable Mark' became WA's rock star Premier

"Mark McGowan is on the verge of becoming the most dominant political leader in WA in decades," one Liberal MP conceded.

Both sides of politics believe Mr McGowan's popularity skyrocketed during and after the first wave of COVID-19 in WA, with the Premier winning public applause for his handling of the pandemic.

Polls have backed that up, giving Mr McGowan a previously unheard of tick of approval from around nine out of 10 voters.

Coming up against that was never going to be easy for the Liberals.

But as polling day draws nearer, the risks and consequences are becoming increasingly stark.

Three Liberal seats in firing line

Of the 13 seats the Liberals hold, many within the party are very worried about three — Darling Range, Hillarys and Riverton.

Kalgoorlie is also something of a concern for some Liberals, although most are confident leader Zak Kirkup will hold his seat of Dawesville.

Potential Liberal gains also appear few and far between; insiders say they have some chance of picking up Kingsley, Albany and Murray-Wellington, but few other Labor seats are seen as being seriously in play.

Meet the WA Labor candidates riding the wave of Premier Mark McGowan's unprecedented pandemic popularity all the way into traditional Liberal strongholds.

WA Liberal leader Zak Kirkup fears Labor is heading towards an "absolute landslide" State election victory, frankly admitting "it's not my time, but I'm not going to give up fighting".

In an unprecedented move by the leader of a major political party, Mr Kirkup said it was time to stop "playing people for fools" and instead be honest about the "impending reality".

"I accept it's not my time, but I'm not going to give up fighting," Mr Kirkup said in an extraordinary interview on the first day of early voting on Wednesday.

Why would Zak Kirkup concede defeat just two weeks out from WA's election?

It was an extraordinary and highly risky admission by a party leader just two weeks out from a state election.

WA Liberal leader Zak Kirkup admitted what Liberals have been privately saying for months, that Labor is on track to win the election comfortably.

"I have to be real with the people of Western Australia, and they are telling me that they expect Mark McGowan will still be Premier," Mr Kirkup said.

"That doesn't mean we stop fighting, that doesn't mean we stop working to get as many Liberals over the line as possible," he said.

While it comes as no surprise that Labor is on track to win, it is an unprecedented move for a party leader to make the admission while campaigning is still underway.

Hours later, the Premier emphatically backtracked.

"When we talk about extending the system, it's about extending the checks at the border," Mr McGowan said.

"The G2G pass, once the pandemic is over, we don't intend to extend its use."

Keep in mind, just hours earlier Mr McGowan had repeatedly refused to rule that out.

And in the immediate aftermath, government spin doctors were confirming that continuing the G2G pass was an option being discussed — removing any doubt that the Premier had been misinterpreted.

McGowan's 'gold standard' of transparency lacking with \$3 million of 'dark money' received by Labor

Looming election wipe-out the final turn in WA Liberals' long downwards spiral



How did it come to this for the WA Liberals?

First thing's first, it's not neophyte WA opposition leader Zak Kirkup's fault, or at least not mostly.

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His decision to run up the white flag conceding he wouldn't win Saturday's state election more than two-and-a-half weeks before polling day caught national headlines, but it is the end of the story, not the beginning; the patient's terminal symptom rather than its underlying pathology.

In truth there has been a steady degradation of the party's grassroots that stretches back more than a decade.

That degradation has been masked by a once dominant state leader, a fundraising mirage that was more due to Federal Labor than the WA Liberals, and the passing of a dominant generation of federal MPs who have punched above their weight at the national level.

For the past two weeks Zak Kirkup has made clear his belief this election is about little more than saving the remaining furniture for the Liberals. Today, they set it on fire.
