





US Navy Warships Transit Taiwan Strait

- 28 Aug 22 Two USN guided missile cruisers from the US 7th Fleet sailed through Taiwan Strait in an area outside of both Beijing's or Taipei's coastal waters.
- 28 Aug 22 In response to that USN Freedom of Navigation Operations (FONOP), China went on 'high alert'. The PLA stated it was "ready to thwart any provocation."

Asia-Pacific: Defence budgets 2022







Impacts on Australia from War in the South China Sea

Strategic - Alliance management (AUKUS, ANZUS); ADF contribution and involvement; escalation beyond region and across multiple domains of warfare; complementary action alongside Russia's ambitions.

Geo-political – some states may remain neutral; out of region force projection; extreme limitation of Sea Lines of Communications (SLOCs).

Economic – reduced FDI, loss of access to export markets, supply shortages (such as energy), adverse effect on regional trading partners: China, Japan and South Korea, ASEAN states, and global economy.
